- The HSC Trial and the Year 11 Preliminary Course Examinations commenced on Thursday 15 August and concluded on Friday 30 August. Reports from staff indicated that students participated well in these important exams. The Year 12 Trial Examinations were the final school assessment and - for those students completing examinations in Board Developed subjects – provided the opportunity to complete exams that mirror those for the HSC.
- Many of the Year 12 students have completed Major Works as part of their HSC courses. Congratulations to all students and the staff involved, the amount of time and effort that went into these works is to be commended. Students were recognised by the school at the Major Works Assembly.
- Year 11 students completed the formal sign out of their Preliminary courses in preparation for commencing Year 12 in Term 4. The "new" Year 12 group will commence on 14 October.
- Year 11 VET students participated in their first round of compulsory Work Placements. For most students, this will mean that they have completed 35 hours of their 70 hours of Work Placement. Congratulations to those students who were successful in their Work Placement, this will put them in a good position as they move into Year 12.
- Term 3 saw the introduction of the Junior AECG at the school. This important group is affiliated with the Pemulwuy AECG.
- Year 12 Support students were given the opportunity to participate in an overnight excursion to Canberra and are busy working with staff to finalise their Individual Transition Plans as they move toward completing school.
- Our Boys and Girls Rugby League teams represented the campus and the College well in a number of competitions. Well done to the students and coaching staff for representing the school with pride.

TUESDAY 24th SEPTEMBER 2019

Year 11 is quickly drawing to a close and by the time you read this newsletter, students should have completed all exams and assessment tasks, ready to sign out of their Year 11 Preliminary courses to enter their Year 12 Higher School Certificate courses on Day 1, Term 4.

Students have received an individualised letter which outlines their responsibilities to ensure that they meet all the requirements of completing the Preliminary HSC. These include:

- Completing any outstanding assessment work/classwork;
- Having class teachers sign-off to say that they are satisfactory in all six courses studied;
- Returning any textbooks/library books that have been used for Preliminary courses;
- Paying any outstanding fees and contributions (an invoice is attached to the letter).

If you have not received the letter, please contact the front office as a matter of urgency so that your child is able to meet the requirements to move from Year 11 to Year 12. Assessment Help Centre

HELPI

Each **Thursday from 1.10pm** the Assessment Help Centre has a team of staff ready to assist you in any homework and/or outstanding assessment tasks. You must

remember that in order to progress to Year 12, you must be **SATISFACTORY** in all **SIX** courses studied in Year 11. We are here to help you achieve that. Use the Assessment Help Centre to your advantage.



Remember, the only uniform permitted at Senior Campus is our campus uniform. Please ensure that any sporting attire is 'Brand Chifley' so that you are adhering to our Campus Policy. Thank you to the majority of you who do so. If you are deemed to be in unsatisfactory uniform, please deal with the consequence and ensure it does not happen again. If you have had an article of clothing confiscated and are yet to collect it, please do so at your earliest convenience.



We have made it through unscathed! Well done to all of you for putting in a great effort during the Examination Period in Weeks 4 – 6. Staff have been busy marking examinations and you should by now have your examinations back with feedback.



Please take the advice of your teachers wisely and utilise it as you move into the HSC year.

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Please ensure that you ask each of your course teachers to sign off your satisfactory status leading up to sign out. If you are told that you are not satisfactory, you must complete the

tasks indicated by your teacher prior to Sign Out Day.

DRP

On Sign Out Day, you will visit each of the Head Teachers of the courses you study to be signed out of Year 11. If your classroom teacher has not supported your sign out due to an unsatisfactory status of your course, you will be counselled by the Year 11 Leadership Team on how you can prevent it from happening again and resume Year 12 once you are back to satisfactory in those courses.

You are now young adults responsible for your own HSC journey, please make the Sign Out process easy by being prepared early and returning your completed Sign Out sheets to Suzie or Rob for safe keeping come Sign Out Day.

Sign Out day is **Tuesday 24th September 2019**, **Periods 1 and 2**.





We should all know by now that school starts at 8.40am. You must ensure that you arrive at the campus no later than 8.30am each morning.

Being late not only impacts you at

the gate but interrupts the learning of your peers when you enter the classroom after the class has commenced.

Set an alarm clock that enables you to get to school on time, every time!



Year 12 is not easy by any means and organisation is key to lowering stress and anxiety levels. If you feel as though you are not coping and are in need of extra

support in the classroom, see Nikki Beaton who may be able to offer support in the way of an extra support person in your classroom. Our friendly SLSO's are here to support you on your HSC journey.

Please also do not forget that Shobah Yadav, our campus counsellor, is available to help Tuesday, Thursdays and Fridays. Pop in and say hi!

Those of you who have major projects for courses during your HSC must be diligent in organisation and stay on top of the requirements for a successful submission. Remember, a major project is a FOUR term commitment and a work in progress over that time. Make sure you check in regularly with your teacher to make sure you are on track.



All VET students will have completed their first compulsory work placement towards the end of Year 11 with some completing it in Term 1 of Year 12. Please

remember that a FULL 5 days must be undertaken otherwise you will be required to find your own work placement to complete any days missed to be eligible to be signed off. This will be the same for your second work placement in Year 12. Failure to do so will mean failing that VET subject and for

some students will mean not getting your HSC. Please do not get yourself into this situation. Complete ALL work placement days when they are allocated.

Well done to all 2019 Year 12 students for making it through to your final Term of study at the Senior Campus. The Year 12 team has enjoyed working with you over the last year and a half and feel confident you will use the short time left at the Senior to prepare well for final exams and post-school life. But it is not over yet! Here are some things to be thinking about.

GRIAL EXAMINACIONS

By the time you read this the Trial HSC Examinations will be well underway and staff will be busy marking, ensuring that the final rankings for Board Developed courses are finalised prior to submission to NESA. These exams form an important part of the assessment process for your courses but also give you the chance to experience exam conditions similar to the HSC Examinations you will experience in Term 4.

Use the Trials to identify areas you can improve for the HSC. Even small improvements can make a big difference.



Graduation day is one of the biggest days in the Chifley Calendar. It is the day we celebrate your achievement in completing formal school study. As always, the event will take place on the Thursday of Week 10, Term 4. This year this falls on Thursday, 26th September. It will take place in the campus Multi-Purpose Centre (MPC) at the Senior Campus and family and friends of graduating students are encouraged to attend.

On the day students need to go to F-Block (Art Rooms) to collect their graduation gown and medal. **This process runs from 8am.** Parents and family members are requested to attend from 9:00am to be seated for a 9.45am sharp start of the ceremony.

A \$20 (2 x \$10 notes) deposit is required when collecting the gown and \$10 will be refunded on the return of the gown. Full academic dress (full uniform) is required with **no track-pants** permitted. It is important you look good for this event. Most people only graduate once from High School!

HSC PERFORMANCE EXAMS

Congratulations to all students who have completed major works and practical assessments. There are several courses requiring major works or performances and these usually require great dedication and many hours of preparation by the students involved. Congratulations and many thanks must also go to the staff members who have guided students through preparing major works. A Major Works Assembly will take place on Thursday 19 September 2019 (Term 3 Week 9) to celebrate the effort of students completing major works. Students who have completed the following courses may be involved - Aboriginal Studies, Dance, Visual Arts, Industrial Technology (Timber, Multimedia and Graphic Design), Design and Technology and Society and Culture.



Final reports will be issued on Graduation Day as part of the students' graduation folder package. This will happen at the end of the ceremony.

Students with unresolved N Award warnings should

work with their teachers to resolve these by Week 8 so that their courses can be satisfactorily completed.



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During the first three days of Term 4, before the HSC Examinations start on Thursday 17/10/19, students preparing for exams will be able to attend tutorials with their teachers. Students should check with their teachers as to when these sessions will be held.



Places are filling for our Year 12 formal to be held at The Colebee Centre, Nurragingy Reserve, Doonside on Tuesday 19th November. Remember the early bird price of \$110 expires



on Graduation Day with a one-off full payment required to the Administration Office. This event is always a highlight and not something you want to miss out on. The formal has been held at Nurragingy for several years and has always been a fun, successful evening.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS UPDATE

In Term 2, Chifley College Senior Campus implemented phase 2 of the schools literacy and numeracy plan. This involved commencing high levels of targeted support, as part of our **Healthy Student Check** initiative, to assist students in gaining the **HSC Minimum Standards** proficiency qualification. Selected students were enrolled in an additional literacy or numeracy class, where they received small group assistance to develop their reading and writing skills. Congratulations to our students who graduated from this program! Over 90% of participants have now



gained the HSC Minimum Standards proficiency qualification, and are on track for the HSC!

Term 3 marks the beginning of phase 3 of our plan. A large number of Y11 students have been enrolled in an additional literacy and / or numeracy class, and issued with a new timetable. These classes provide targeted and small group support to help students develop their core learning skills, and meet the requirements for the HSC and beyond. Once students have demonstrated proficiency in Numeracy, Writing and Reading they will resume their standard pattern of study.

We have a wonderful cross-faculty literacy and numeracy team at Chifley College Senior Campus, who are

committed to ensuring all students standards. meet minimum Importantly, we fundamentally believe that literacy and numeracy is the basis for all learning, and have ensured that quality literacy and numeracy instruction is embedded across our curriculum. 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What a year it has been in the Chifley Senior Clontarf Academy.

Our boys have achieved so much in a short space of time this year, they have embraced their schooling and participated in various community engagements, leadership camps and out of school activities that will help mould them into well rounded adults in the future.

Some of the activities and engagements that we have participated in are:

- > Visits to various work sites as part of the boys experiencing a wide range of employment opportunities
 - UGL, Holsworth Army Barracks, Macquarie University, Kmart, Mt Druitt Police Station, Fox Sports, Bunnings and Blackwoods just to name a few.-
- Some of the boys have completed camps
 - on Cockatoo Island, Corrimal Surf Lifesaving Club, Dubbo and Shoalhaven this gets our boys out of their comfort zone to explore some of the country life while experiencing new skills and meeting new people.
- The boys have also had the chance to play other Clontarf Academies in Sydney and around the state through such games as:
 - Oz Tag, Rugby League and Basketball.
- > Employment Work Ready documents the boys work hard in after school activities:
 - to gain their drivers licence, TFN, resume, USI, bank account.

Sport is where the boys really excel, they love the training sessions we put them through every Tuesday and Thursday morning before school which helps with their well-being and getting up early ready for school. Sport also helps engage our boys in their school work.

We are already seeing some very positive feedback from parents of the boys. Getting our boys through their senior schooling and into work is our reason for being, but we are definitely not alone in seeking to achieve this. We look forward to continuing to strengthen our partnership with the school, with parents and with the wider community in seeking to make a real difference in the lives of our Clontarf boys.

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Did you know that a forensic odontologist could provide insight into our understanding of Egyptian Mummies? Or that the Lucas Heights reactor was integral in dating the organic remains? Or that X-rays and CT scans can provide information about age, sex and lifestyle?

Mamafa and Allen from Extension History had the opportunity to get up close and personal with Nicholson Museum mummies Horus, Meruah, Padiashaikhet and Mer-Neith-it-es at the University of Sydney Mummy Symposium. Both students were able to listen to a series of short talks from the multi discipline team, providing the chance to learn about the mummies, but also the changing nature of history and archaeology. By combining science, data analytics, computer design, languages, archaeology and historical analysis, these mummies have the chance to tell their story in new and exciting ways. This raises all sorts of questions about who is a historian, the study of history, and the nature of truth and changing interpretations that is fundamental to Extension History course. Mamafa, felt that "scientific the study of Horus really helped me to connect with him. He was front tooth. He was just a kid, and thinking about missing а kids I know that are only 8 or 9 really made me empathise. It's easy to forget that human remains are people and this new scientific investigation is changing the way I think about the past think about history." and the way I

It was the study of Mer-Neith-it-es that had the biggest impact for Allen. "I want to go to University, but it's always been computer engineering, or science, or history. Most people tell me that these disciplines have nothing in common. But these historical and archaeological projects, they are science projects. They need computer engineers to write software and do analysis that understand history and archaeology. History is multidisciplinary and it really helped me understand that there is scope within my interests to embrace all my skills."

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Mamafa, Allen and Grace would like to thank the Nicholson Museum for hosting this event, and especially Dr Conni Lord and Dr Estelle Lazer who introduced extension history students to Mer-Neith-it-es in person late last year.

Allen and Mamafa meet Horus at the Sydney University Mummy Symposium





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Students at Chifley College Senior Campus were thrown into the political intrigues of Julius Caesar's Rome, and daily life in Pompeii as part of a collaboration between the school and Sydney University historians.

Across two days, Chifley College hosted special guests Dr Estelle Lazer and Associate Professor Kathryn Welch from the **'Pompeii Cast Project'**.

Their fabulous public lecture on Thursday night was attended by more than 150 members of the Western Sydney community, including parents, students and teachers from the region.

Dr Lazer updated the audience on the ways that new scientific research and technology have changed our understanding of life and death in Pompeii, as well as debunking many of the myths about the plaster cast remains.

Around 100 students from Chifley College then participated in Friday's enrichment activities, including lectures from Dr Lazer and Associate Professor Welch, as well as access to an escape room, an archaeological dig, a fresco restoration team, a slave auction and even a Roman weapons display.

Year 12 student Holly Towner said the immersion program was a great experience.

"The Roman-themed Julius Caesar escape room was a really fun and engaging way to start the day and to learn about the political environment in Rome," Holly said.

"The expert talk from Associate Professor Kathryn Welch on inscriptions and epigraphic evidence helped us understand so much about life in Pompeii and appreciate that it was very unique – women were able to hold significant power and wealth, and we can see that through tombs, inscriptions and monuments.

"The day culminated in a lecture from Dr Lazer, where she explained some of the findings of the Pompeii Cast Project, and the technology used by the team. This was really beneficial – it links directly to the HSC syllabus but it was also really interesting to hear about how this new evidence is disrupting the popular narrative that we take for granted about these casts."

Fellow student Grace Major said Chifley College history students were gaining real-world insights into history through the collaboration with Sydney University.

"We've been so lucky to be involved in this project. We've travelled into Sydney University on a number of occasions and worked closely with Associate Professor Welch and Dr Lazer," she said.

"We've learnt that historians need to write research and funding proposals, we've been mentored and supported regarding our HSC and what we're going to do when we are finished school, and we've even had opportunities to look at Egyptian human remains and see how they study a sarcophagus in the Nicholson museum.

"Having our school involved in this project has been the most interesting and most rewarding part of our HSC."

The Personal Interest project requires students to undertake in depth primary and secondary research, including field work. This primary research may include interviews, focus groups, content analysis, participant observation, questionnaires and an ethnographic study. Students must formulate a hypothesis, and then use primary and secondary research methodologies to explore their topics and draw conclusions. This sociological research is substantive, with students producing 6500 words of academic research, an additional annotated bibliography of approx. 4000 words, and a process journal.

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Studying for the HSC Legal Studies exam

Here are some ideas to help you prepare for the Legal Studies exam. Hopefully you will find one or two that suit your style of study.

Past Papers – Go to the NESA website and download exam papers from previous years. You can also download the answers to some questions, and the comments made by markers. You will become familiar with the layout of the paper and the types of questions that are asked.

Plan essays – Select an essay and write a scaffold for it. Do not spend hours writing an entire essay, it is more important that you scaffold several essays as this will allow you to go back through your notes for legislation, cases etc, and enable you to revise that topic. Don't avoid questions that appear too hard as you just might be given a similar style question this year.

Multiple choice – print off the multiple choice questions from the past couple of years. Practice answering them. You will note that the questions are similar in style, year to year. Try and get faster at reading and answering them. Check your answers, and for those you get wrong, go over your notes to see why. There are 20 easy marks to be had if you keep practising.

Syllabus dot points – Select a dot point, then write down everything you know about it, or that links to it. Set a time of 5 minutes. If you can't remember much, then use your notes to revise.

Media – Keep up to date with the news as you might be able to link an essay topic to a story or headline that you have recently seen.

Rugby League Program Report

It has been a very busy term for the Chifley College Rugby League Program as the St Mary's Cup and University Shield competitions heated up with the program participating in some huge matches across the state of New South Wales.

In the St Mary's Cup competition the program won three of its four preliminary matches to qualify for its third consecutive Grand Final. With our only loss coming against Endeavour Sports High School we faced off against them in a rematch in the Grand Final. We



established an early 16-0 lead but unfortunately lost our composure and fell to Endeavour for the second time this season 16-26 finishing runners up in the St Mary's Cup in 2019. What is Work Placement?

Work Placement is a planned opportunity in a workplace that enables senior students to experience the industry that their chosen subject is aligned with. It allows the students to gain

industry knowledge and practice and develop their employability skills in a real work experience.

Work Placement is a mandatory component of Vocational Education and Training in Schools. Students need to complete a total of **70 hours**.

35 hours in Yrll and 35 hours in Yrl2.

35 hours equals 5 Days work. A FULL 5 days of work needs to be completed. If this is not completed then the students will be required to find their own work placement to be eligible to be signed off.

Work Placement is a vital part of the students learning and it can impact on the students gaining their HSC if it is not completed. Please do not get yourself into this situation. Complete ALL work placement days when they are allocated.

This year the **Student Learning Team** has had a strong focus on developing student well-being. Every student in Year 11 has been given the opportunity to list a teacher mentor, so that they can identify a staff member to whom they can confidently turn to for advice and assistance at school. Over 50% of Year 11 students have chosen to take up this opportunity within the school. We encourage the remaining Year 11 students to choose a teacher mentor.

Following the Year 12 English Trial HSC Examination, the Student Learning Team hosted a sausage sizzle, along with some fun activities, to allow teachers to informally "check-in" on their student's mental well-being, at what can be a stressful time for the Year 12 students. It also allowed the students to debrief with each other and relax after one of their first major examinations.

The Assessment Help Centre continues to run on a Thursday afternoon in the library, providing students with the opportunity to complete their course work and assessments in a supportive environment where they can utilise the computers and teachers. Please come along and use this wonderful resource.

The **Staff Learning Team** has implemented numerous professional development programs, opportunities and initiatives. The main focus of the team has been in the area of reflective practice. A significant percentage of the staff have contributed to professional development feedback an information sharing exercise that has become part of the school culture. Participants have shared information on their PD sessions and in-services and then provided constructive feedback. This helped all staff to grow and develop their understanding of practise, pedagogy and training outside of their KLA's.

Greater awareness of on-line resources to access development opportunities from professional associations was also covered in staff development days. Staff were also in-serviced in how to effectively use MyPL and eTAMS sites and how best to undertake their journey towards maintenance of a proficient standard. Staff wishing to accelerate were given opportunities, mentoring and a scaffold to assist them to achieve HALT (Highly Accomplished and Leading Teacher) status. In summary all staff were actively engaged, this semester, in evaluating the effectiveness of professional learning activities.

The *Inclusive Learning Team* Staff Development Day in Term 3 focused on ways that staff can support our students with NCCD Plans. There was a presentation to staff to demonstrate a variety of activities that staff can implement to create and develop the adjustments and accommodations that students require to help with their learning.

Our SLSO's have been working collaboratively with teachers supporting students in the classroom to achieve best educational outcomes. They have been assisting students in the Homework Help Centre, supporting the students with their preparation for exams and sitting with those students who need extra support and assistance.

During 2019, the purpose of the **School Learning Team** has been the continued establishment of reciprocal relationships between the Chifley College Senior Campus and the community.

The team has made a concerted effort to increase the involvement of students, parents and the community in activities, which promote the positive aspects of school life.

The school Facebook and Instagram pages continue to engage the school population. The platforms provide instant information regarding extra-curricular activities and other school activities. Each faculty is represented and contributes to Facebook and Instagram posts.

School Counsellor Corner

Exams can be a stressful time for you and your children. Some students may be very stressed and anxious. Some feel very confident because they have worked hard throughout the year and wish to achieve their personal best. On the other hand some students may not be too motivated to try hard. No matter what your child is like, most students need encouragement and support during exams.

Things that help:

- 1. Provide them with a quiet and comfortable place to study. Avoid family gatherings during exams.
- 2. Encourage regular breaks during study. It helps to remember better.
- 3. Supply them with healthy meals. Don't let them skip meals.
- 4. Emphasise the importance of good sleep and moderate exercise as it boosts concentration and memory.
- 5. Minimise disruptions. If possible, minimise their household chores so they have more time to study.
- 6. Keep gentle communication open. Show interest in what is happening during exams.
- 7. Listen. Show compassion. They are more likely to come to you and discuss their concerns when they are ready.
- 8. Appreciate what your child is good at. Compliment them regularly.
- 9. Encourage them to ask for help from teachers and the school counsellor. No issue should be ignored if it is causing concern. Even a small one can impact on your child's ability to learn and perform in the exam.
- 10. Check your child's exam timetable. Familiarise yourself with the dates. Remind them the night before.
- 11. Wake them up early. Make sure they have their breakfast as it helps keep them calm and focus better.
- 12. Remind them to be at school at least 15 minutes before the exam starts. Often students read the exam questions incorrectly or answer them wrong if they are rushing.
- 13. Be mindful that your child is not using unhelpful coping strategies. For example, negative thinking styles, such as "I am going to fail" and "I will forget everything", make them more nervous and impacts negatively on their exams. Some students rely too much on caffeine. Please remind them that a balanced life style works better.
- 14. Relaxed and focused breathing exercises help students calm down.
- 15. Help your children see the whole picture. Discuss the plans after the HSC. Remind them about different options once they complete the HSC so they worry less. Such examples are further study at TAFE/ University or work.
- 16. Listen to their concerns without judging them. Remember you are trying to help them.

Things to avoid:

- 1. Do not nag or criticise. It does not work at all. If they have made mistakes in the past, this is not the time to discuss them because it would make things worse.
- 2. Do not compare children, especially with their siblings and friends.
- 3. Do not remind them about your sacrifices.
- 4. Parents could impose their anxiety on their children unintentionally. Stay calm and trust your children.
