Life Ready Workshop 2019





On Thursday October 17 and Friday October 18 the Year 11 2019 cohort completed two days of Life Ready workshops aimed at building skills in resilience, self-awareness, personal values, establishing and managing relationships and preparing for further education and employment.

The students participated in eight workshops across the two days and were treated to a BBQ for lunch on both days. The eight workshops the students participated in were:

<u>Drumming</u> - An external provider came in with traditional African drums and treated the students to a team building and musical experience. This workshop was very well received and the students enjoyed it.

<u>Career Planet</u> - An external provider conducted a seminar on career skills and educated the students on the Career Planet app which allows students to learn employment skills and to search for opportunities all within the app.

<u>Fail Big</u> - Aimed at building skills around independence and self-awareness to encourage the students to strive for consistent improvement and to take opportunities presented to them without the fear of failure. Failure is not a permanent state.

Teamwork... Does It Work - Team based activities in small groups, competitive games to get the students understanding the critical skills which are needed to succeed within a team environment.

<u>Scroll, Click, Tap, Double Tap</u> - A workshop aimed at engaging students in the correct way to use technology.

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Just One Drink - A workshop that highlights the dangers of drinking to excess and the impact alcohol has on our ability to make rational decisions.

<u>**Resilience**</u> - This workshop was aimed at building skills to cope in difficult situations and understanding how to work through challenging scenarios that may arise in life.

<u>Amazing Race</u> - The students had to race to different locations around the school and complete challenges in order to attempt to finish first.

Overall, the two days were a success and the student evaluations indicated they were very happy with the workshops. A big thank you to all staff who assisted across the two days.



2019 Leadership Camp

The Leadership Camp started off with some very keen and eager students arriving at school for the bus ride to YMCA Yarramundi Camp. Upon arrival, the students began an activity based around getting to know themselves and their fellow campers. It was a great opportunity for the students to learn about themselves, their peers and the Leadership Staff.



The students then split into two groups – one group went kayaking and the other group had the chance to participate in Multi Group challenges – after lunch the groups swapped activities. CHIFLEY COLLEGE SENIOR CAMPUS STUDENTS WIN ESSAY PRIZE

Tahlara Mazzelli was named the winner of the 2019 Sydney University Modern History Essay Competition, one of the school's top prizes for Year 11 History Students. Alicia Wilson and Blake Lumsden were awarded



David Ibekaku, the winner of the 2019 Ancient History Essay Competition, explored the value and limitations of the Biblical and archaeological sources in an assessment of King David of Israel's rule. The judges noted that "scholarship about the rule of King David is quite polarised. David examined the inherent bias in sources and explored both the benefits of the King's rule as well as his weakness as a man to see King David as a king who brought benefits to Israel despite his human failings." Sebastian Pijov, awarded second place, researched Justinian I, one of the important later Roman and Byzantine Emperors. equal second.

Tahlara, a prolific reader and writer about Modern History issues was praised for writing an essay on Winston Churchill's role in WW2, and the secret war in India that "was wellwritten and well-presented, and demonstrates both sound knowledge of the content, and a sophisticated University-level approach to the topic. Tahlara's explanation demonstrated a sophisticated historical analysis".

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The essay competition is held in conjunction with the Department of History at Sydney University, and judged by academics from both the modern and ancient disciplines. Sydney University and Chifley College Senior Campus have been working together since 2014 as part of an equity program in order to encourage students to achieve academic excellence and to consider University as an option. In 2019, five students have been awarded conditional scholarships under the Sydney University E12 program. As well as the essay competition, the partnership includes a mentoring program with History Extension students as well as regular visits of senior students to the university campus.



Grace, who placed first in the competition in 2018 and won the 2019 award for an exemplar Society and Culture PIP, spent some time talking to current students at Sydney University, chatting about school and university life. She believes that the chance to work alongside university students, and have them support her in her studies, provided her with an opportunity "to get a feel for what University will be like. It's been really useful, and made me think about what I will do after my HSC". The judges said, in responding to her Personal Interest Project, "one of the real highlights of this project is the way it applies theory to the problem. The choice of the corps

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propre as a central concept is well-justified in the text and is cleverly incorporated throughout the project. This is something that even professional academics struggle with!"

Tahlara, Alicia, Blake, David and Sebastian were presented with their awards on November 22nd, by Professor Michael McDonnell from Sydney University. The awards are presented to those students who have explored an area of history to a high academic standard, using sources, exploring historiographical issues and drawing sophisticated conclusions.

Included in this package is the Year 12 Semester 1 Interim Reports.

These reports are a snapshot of your progress in the first 5 weeks of Term 4. They indicate your performance in your HSC studies for:

- ✓ Punctuality
- ✓ Completion on Course Outcomes
- ✓ Classroom Participation

They also indicate how many lessons you have attended in the first 5 weeks out of 15 lessons. If you have a heavily reduced attendance it may have been affected by late course changes. Please see Rob or Suzie if you are concerned.

Interim reports bring us to another issue. As Year 12 is already underway, there will be no major course changes completed from now on. The courses you are currently enrolled in will be the courses you carry through to your HSC in 2020.



All students have been issued their HSC assessment booklets and the NESA guidelines during a cohort assembly. This enables you to be organised and prepare for tasks/examinations well in advance. If you have not received your copy, see Rob.

Work Placement is well underway for our VET courses. If you study Retail Services, Business Services, Metals and Engineering, Hospitality,

Construction or IDT please ensure you complete your school sourced work placement when organised.



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70 hours of mandatory work **FLAGEMENT** placement must be completed in order to

graduate and gain the certification.

You must also ensure that you complete your

assessments to gain your competencies. See Ben if you have any issues regarding your placement or your progression in your VET courses.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS UPDATE

In Term 4, Chifley College Senior Campus implemented phase 3 of the schools literacy and numeracy plan. This involved commencing high levels of targeted support, through full day immersion programs, to assist students in gaining the **HSC Minimum Standards** proficiency qualification. Selected students were enrolled in an additional full day literacy or numeracy class, where they received small group assistance to develop their reading and writing skills. Congratulations to our students who graduated from this program! Once students have demonstrated proficiency in Numeracy, Writing and Reading they will resume their standard pattern of study.

In Term 3, our literacy and numeracy Minimum Standards team was nominated for, and won, a regional award for excellence in teaching. This prestigious award recognises our outstanding student growth, and our 55% increase in the number of students meeting HSC Minimum Standards. This means that the majority of our HSC 2020 students are well and truly on track to sit the HSC. We are committed to continuing to provide support for all students continuing to work towards proficiency in HSC Minimum Standards, and will provide a range on interventions in 2020.



FUNDING FOR 2020

All NSW Department of Education Schools have recently received the 2020 Planned School Budget Allocation Report (SBAR) showing the total budget delivered to schools through the Resource Allocation Model (RAM). Funding to NSW public schools through the RAM methodology is in its seventh year. Through the RAM, more resources are allocated to schools with the greatest need.

The SBAR outlines funds allocated for the school staffing entitlement as well as the (RAM) loadings. The planned SBAR is based on the anticipated enrolments for 2020, there will be some adjustment once the final student numbers are submitted in February 2020.

Schools are expected to expend funds in the year they are received and are accountable for the expenditure of the funds. At Senior Campus, the funding received in RAM loadings is used to support and maintain programs developed to address the needs of groups of students or individual students. The funds provided to Chifley College Senior Campus enable the school to target resources to the needs of every student.

The RAM loadings also enable the school to employ additional teaching and other support staff to supplement the school staffing entitlement, thus facilitating ongoing development and implementation of programs in the school.

School Planning Update Term 4

Student Learning Team: Firstly, thank you to all the students who participated in the Tell Them From Me Surveys throughout the year. Secondly, thank you to the parents and carers who participated in the Tell Them From Me Parent Survey last month. We appreciate you taking the time to provide the school with your feedback regarding your experiences with Chifley Senior. Using the results from all the surveys, we are developing future focus areas for the Student Learning Team. One of these focus areas is to providing every student with access to a Mentor. A mentor is someone you have a connection with, someone that you believe can help guide you through your remaining time here at Chifley Senior and help with that next transition in your life. Currently, 75% of New Yr12 students have selected a mentor. Our aim is to get to 100%. So, parents and carers, please ask your child if they have selected a mentor, ask them who it is and how often are they seeing them outside of learning time. If they haven't selected a mentor, please encourage them to come and see either Dani Swindle or Ben Coburn.

The *Staff Learning Team* have been working on the School Assessment and Planning Tool and an evaluation of the milestones for 2019. The push towards Highly Accomplished and Lead Teacher Accreditation continues with a College initiative taken up by several staff members and this has been a focus of discussions of the group. The team will undergo a training and development day in late November that will have presentations by Michael Hooker Director Educational Leadership Mt Druitt Network, Stacie Connor Deputy Principal Chifley College and Robbie Hillier PDHPE Teacher, on: HALT; State and department perspective, future strategic directions and guiding the staff through the Accreditation process.

The **School Learning Team** has continued to utilise the social media platforms of Facebook and Instagram to communicate information to the school community.

Weekly school events, HSC examination dates and student achievements have been communicated through these mediums. The minimum standards team also uses these social media platforms to give community updates on the student's successes within the program.

The School Learning team has been involved in the establishment of a booklet on subject information for school events such as the Chifley College Senior Open



Night, which was held in Week 3 of the term. The booklet gave parents and students, further information on subject selection information for Stage 6 courses.

The *Inclusive Learning Team* have continued supporting the students on NCCD with staff all completing their individual plans for each of the students. The plans highlight the various modifications and adjustments that have been embedded into the student's classes to help them understand the content of each subject.

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Inclusive Learning Team cont...

Our Support Teacher Transition Suzan Clear has been developing opportunities for our Support Unit students as they transition out of school. She has been facilitating transition links for the graduating Year 12 and establishing relationships with the new Year 12. This involved setting up one on one meetings with the Local Area Coordinator for NDIS. These meetings enabled the students to develop autonomy in negotiating and succeeding a successful path through the NDIS.

Our Job Search Program teacher Belindah Quinlan conducted a Graduation Ceremony at the end of Term 3 and we wish the students all the very best in their future endeavours. The Job Search Program have had a focus on goalsetting this term and they have been providing the students with opportunities to complete a Trade Readinses Course in Bricklaying, as well as Hair & Beauty - as part of the YES Program – these programs provide the students with hands on experiences whilst glimpsing at what TAFE has to offer.



We have been investigating various options to support our Aboriginal students – especially our girls - moving into 2020. This included a fact finding tour by our staff to Dubbo College to look at the various programs and supports they have running at their Senior Campus.

- If you have not advised the school of a change of address, you will need to complete a change of address form from the school office before your Opal card can be approved for the new address.
- If you need to replace your Opal card, a \$10 fee may be applicable.

Shine and Strength personal development courses are facilitated for young people to enhance their sense of value and identity; understand the power of choice and grow in emotional resilience; and encourage participants to dream and set goals for their future. They aim to equip young people with the knowledge and skills needed to develop greater self-awareness and personal growth.

ENGLISH ENHANCED

Successful Completion of Year 11

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As part of the Belvoir Arts Access Program, we are privileged to receive theatre tickets to selected performances at Belvoir Theatre in Surry Hills. On Thursday, 24 October, thirty of our students attended the play, *Fangirls*. And what a play it was!

Fangirls is a musical written by Yve Blake. It concerns 14-year-old Edna, a diehard fan of the biggest boy band in the world, True Connection, and its lead singer Harry. Edna is determined to meet Harry, but there is a small issue in that the group aren't even touring Australia. However, when a tiny window of opportunity opens Edna decides to take it.



Director, Paige Rattray describes the musical as "a celebration of young women, their passion and their power. It is a narrative that we are not often told; that if they put their mind to it, teenage girls can achieve anything." The play certainly communicated this idea, along with an exploration of the way society instils cultural norms onto teenagers, only to then patronise

them. These serious messages are staged with lots of music, singing, dance and humour leaving the mainly teenage audience, and their teachers, enthralled.

A Question & Answer session after the performance allowed our students to ask questions of the writer and the cast, giving them a greater awareness of the decisions made behind the scenes. It also allowed them to ask guestions about how actors manage to stay in character - and remember their lines.

Some of our students were interviewed about the importance of the program, their reaction to



experiencing live theatre and the ways it enhances their HSC learning experience. These interviews will hopefully keep the program alive so our future students can continue to have this experience.

Top Skills and Values Employers Seek from Job-Seekers

Employability skills and personal values are the critical tools and traits you need to succeed in the workplace - and they are all elements that you can learn, cultivate, develop, and maintain over your lifetime.

Numerous studies have identified these critical employability skills, sometimes referred to as "soft skills." We've distilled the skills from these many studies into this list of skills most frequently mentioned. We've also included examples describing each skill; you can adapt these examples for your resumes, cover letters, and interview talking points.

Top skills employers want ...

Communications Skills

By far, the one skill mentioned most often by employers is the ability to listen, write, and speak effectively. Successful communication is critical in business... "Exceptional listener and communicator who effectively conveys information verbally and in writing".

Analytical/Research Skills

Deals with your ability to assess a situation, seek multiple perspectives, gather more information if necessary, and identify key issues that need to be addressed. *"Highly analytical thinking with demonstrated talent for identifying, scrutinizing, improving, and streamlining complex work processes".*

Computer & Technical Literacy

Almost all jobs now require some basic understanding of computer hardware and software, especially word processing, spreadsheets, and email. "Computer-literate performer with extensive software proficiency covering wide variety of application".

Flexibility/Adaptability/Managing Multiple Priorities

Deals with your ability to manage multiple assignments and tasks, set priorities, and adapt to changing conditions and work assignments. *"Flexible team player who thrives in environments requiring ability to effectively prioritize and juggle multiple concurrent projects"*

Interpersonal Abilities

The ability to relate to your co-workers, inspire others to participate, and mitigate conflict with coworkers is essential given the amount of time spent at work each day. "Proven relationship-builder with unsurpassed interpersonal skills".

Leadership/Management Skills

While there is some debate about whether leadership is something people are born with, these skills deal with your ability to take charge and manage your co-workers. "Goal-driven leader who maintains a productive climate and confidently motivates, mobilizes, and coaches employees to meet high performance standards".

Multicultural Sensitivity/Awareness

There is possibly no bigger issue in the workplace than diversity, and job-seekers must demonstrate a sensitivity and awareness to other people and cultures. *"Personable professional whose strengths include cultural sensitivity and an ability to build rapport with a diverse workforce in multicultural settings".*

Planning/Organising

Deals with your ability to design, plan, organize, and implement projects and tasks within an allotted timeframe. Also involves goal-setting. *"Results-driven achiever with exemplary planning and organizational skills, along with a high degree of detail orientation"*.

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Problem-Solving/Reasoning/Creativity

Involves the ability to find solutions to problems using your creativity, reasoning, and past experiences along with the available information and resources. *"Innovative problem-solver who can generate workable solutions and resolve complaints"*.

Teamwork

Because so many jobs involve working in one or more work-groups, you must have the ability to work with others in a professional manner while attempting to achieve a common goal. *"Resourceful team player who excels at building trusting relationships with customers and colleagues"*.

Personal values employers want ...

Of equal importance to skills are the values, personality traits, and personal characteristics that employers seek. Look for ways to weave examples of these characteristics into your resume, cover letters, and answers to interview questions. Here is our list of the 10 most important categories of values.

Honesty & Integrity

Employers probably respect personal integrity more than any other value, especially in light of the many recent corporate scandals. *"Seasoned professional whose honesty and integrity provide for effective leadership and optimal business relationships"*

Adaptability

Deals with openness to new ideas and concepts, to working independently or as part of a team, and to carrying out multiple tasks or projects. *"Highly adaptable, mobile, positive, resilient, patient risk-taker who is open to new ideas"*

Dedication/Hard-Working/Work Ethic/Tenacity.

Employers seek job-seekers who love what they do and will keep at it until they solve the problem and get the job done. *"Productive worker with solid work ethic who exerts optimal effort in successfully completing tasks"*

Loyalty

Employers want employees who will have a strong devotion to the company -- even at times when the company is not necessarily loyal to its employees." Loyal and dedicated manager with an excellent work record".

Reliability

There's no question that all employers desire employees who will arrive to work every day - on time – and ready to work, and who will take responsibility for their actions. *"Dependable, responsible contributor with committed to excellence and success"*.

Positive Attitude & Passion

The job-seekers who get hired and the employees who get promoted are the ones with drive and passion -- and who demonstrate this enthusiasm through their words and actions. *"Energetic performer consistently cited for unbridled passion for work, sunny disposition, and upbeat, positive attitude"*

Professionalism

Deals with acting in a responsible and fair manner in all your personal and work activities, which is seen as a sign of maturity and self-confidence; avoid being petty. "Conscientious go-getter who is highly organized, dedicated, and committed to professionalism".

Self-Confidence

Look at it this way: if you don't believe in yourself, in your unique mix of skills, education, and abilities, why should a prospective employer? Be confident in yourself and what you can offer employers. "Confident, hard-working employee who is committed to achieving excellence".

Self-Motivated

While teamwork is always mentioned as an important skill, so is the ability to work independently, with minimal supervision. *"Highly motivated self-starter who takes initiative with minimal supervision".*

Willingness to Learn

No matter what your age, no matter how much experience you have, you should always be willing to learn a new skill or technique. Jobs are constantly changing and evolving, and you must show an openness to grow and learn with that change. *"Enthusiastic, knowledge-hungry learner, eager to meet challenges and quickly assimilate new concepts"*
